ICLE Updates

The middle school students took part in a symposium last Friday. The word symposium comes from two Greek words meaning to drink together. Originally, this was an opportunity for Greeks to get together and eat, drink and converse on various topics. The word today is now used to describe a collection of speakers on various topics. Our middle school students got to combine the two. They had a symposium about Middle Eastern/Mediterranean music, art, had a speaker who spoke about the faith of Abraham and the virtue of Faith, and got to sample Greek foods. It was an opportunity to see how interconnected all of their learning is and to view faith through the lens of all subjects. The middle school classes will get to experience a symposium each month!

Atrium Updates

I recently had the pleasure of observing the fourth grade class as they participated in the Atrium. They were reviewing the set up of the altar in Mass and the names for each item. Though I am a cradle Catholic, I find that each time that I go, I learn something new in the short 3-5 minute mini-lessons that preface the work time. For example, did you know that the cloth that goes on the altar is called a Corporal. The word corporal means body. This cloth, set under the chalice that holds the body of Christ, called the Ciborium, is there to catch any pieces of Jesus' body that fall. That is also why the cloth is carefully folded then so that any pieces do not fall out. Also, when the water and wine are poured together into the chalice, exactly one drop of water is poured into the wine. The water represents us. The wine represents God. So as the water is dispersed throughout the wine, we are united in God. Upon reflection of this, students made such comments as "It's as if you were dropped in God's love around you" and "You feel loved and you feel you have the Holy Spirit in you".



Living Saints Wax Museum

Our 5th graders did a wonderful job with their Living Saints Wax Museum in honor of All Saints Day! They chose a Saint, researched and wrote a report on that Saint, and then dressed up as their Saint and participated in a Living Wax Museum where parents & students learned more about each of their lives.
