
Saint Brigid Newsletter—One Hundred and Twenty-Eighth Edition, 5/8/2024

From the Principal's Desk

I had the extraordinary privilege of leading the Community of Saints presentation once each month for kindergarten through fifth grade. At Saint Brigid Middle School, students learn the mechanics of a proper handshake and working the room so that they are able to present themselves exceptionally well for opportunities today and in the future. Each student will go through an obstacle course, spending 1 minute interacting with over 20 business professionals from our community. St. Brigid Community Garden Planting

Current & prospective 5th grade students at St. Brigid Catholic School will be planting the community garden on Wednesday, May 29th at 12:30pm, directly in front of the school building on Ashman St. They will plant a seed or young plant in the garden beds and have their picture taken. When they return to school in the Fall, they will be able to see how much their plant(s) have grown, as well as themselves. Students will be able to work as a class to harvest the garden, and it can be utilized in the school kitchen for student lunches and/or donate to the local community organizations. During the growing period, certain crops will be available to be harvested by the community.

Middle School Moving to Block Schedule

Next year, our middle school classes will be moving to a block schedule. A block schedule is a way of scheduling classes where students meet for fewer classes per day but for longer periods. This change will allow us to delve deeply into topics without cutting topics short. The block schedule also allows for variety for students, less time in class transition, and more time to employ multiple modes of instruction. Generally, if you look at research on the topic, the adjustment is minimal and both teachers and students report that they like the schedule. Research also suggests that, academically, students generally benefit from a block schedule. From a Catholic Liberal Arts perspective, it allows us to have the kind of deep discussions with students that will help them grow in virtue, wisdom, and an appreciation for all that is beautiful and good.

Tips from the Reading Specialist

Summer Learning Loss Statistics

- The equivalent of one month of overall learning is lost over Summer break
- 2-3 hours per week during the Summer is needed to prevent learning loss
- 6 weeks in the Fall are spent re-learning previously taught material to make up for Summer learning loss

Cumulative Impact

- Summer slide is cumulative, meaning that the learning losses add up over time
- Research indicates that over a single Summer, students typically lose about 2 months of reading skills
- By the time a student reaches middle school, the cumulative effect of Summer slide can result in the equivalent of 2 years of lost learning

Keep your child reading over the summer. Here is a fun way to support interaction with books being read.

Reading Choice Board

Choose an activity and cross it off once it is completed.

Text to World Connection: After reading a book, think about how something in the book relates to the world. Write 1 sentence making a text to world connection.	Draw a Picture: Read a book then draw a picture of what you read including at least three details (characters, setting, scene from the book, or facts if nonfiction).	Vocabulary: Choose two words in the book that you either do not know or are interested in. Look up the words in a dictionary (or online dictionary).
Retell: Read a story of your choice. Decide if your book is fiction or nonfiction. Fiction: Retell the story to a parent or write it on a sheet of paper. Tell what happened in the beginning, middle, and end of the story. Non-fiction: Write down three facts about your topic	Main Idea: Write about the main idea or theme of the book you read. Find two supporting details to support your answer.	Change: Think about the book or the passage you just read. If you could make one change in the story, what would it be? Write it on a sheet of paper. (examples: add a new character to the story, create a new ending, have the characters eat ice cream instead of pizza, etc.) For non-fiction you might change what topic of information was told-think subtitles.
Author's Purpose: After reading a story or passage, think about why the author chose to write that story. Write one sentence explaining what the purpose of his writing was.	Characters Traits: (Fiction Only) Choose a book to read. Write down the characters on a sheet of paper. Choose 2 characters and write down as many traits you can for each character.	Text to Self-Connection: After reading a book, think about how something in the book relates to you and your life. Write 2 -3 sentences making a text to self-connection.

Summer Tutoring Options

If your student could benefit from tutoring over the summer, both Mrs. Nemeth and Mrs. Graves are available.

Mrs. Nemeth will provide 50 minute individualized reading lessons with a 5 minute recap/homework with parents for Kindergarten-5th graders. Sessions take place at the Grace A. Dow Library M-Th at either 9:15am, 10:15am, 2:00pm, or 3:00pm and cost \$50 per session. You may contact Mrs. Nemeth directly if you are interested (989-941-1620).

MANS Action Alert

Governor Whitmer presented a proposed FY2025 budget in February. Nonpublic schools were not included in several funding opportunities including an appropriation for school safety and mental health initiatives. Nonpublic schools have been eligible for this funding for the past nine years, including a per pupil distribution over the last two years totaling \$36 million. Funding has allowed schools to install and update safety measures in school buildings and has permitted schools to enhance student mental health services.

The <u>Michigan Association of Non-public Schools</u> (MANS), advocates for nonpublic schools, and is working hard to inform state legislators of the importance of this funding for nonpublic schools.
